


The girls were placed 4th overall and the boys came 2nd. It was a great effort by all.

KS4 Aspire Higher **Residential Project**

Across this academic year, the Widening Access Team at the University of Hertfordshire have been working with a group of 25 Year 10 Students on a residential project. By working with these learners, we are aiming to:

- Develop students' confidence, social skills and resilience
- Develop and demonstrate communication, problem solving, leadership and teamwork skills
- Help to remove the barriers to access to higher education in underrepresented groups
- Support students to find the right educational progression for them
- Support students' study skills and academic success

At the point of writing, the students have participated in three workshops, both in school and at the University of Hertfordshire Campus in Hatfield. We have focused on teamwork, student lifestyle and skills, Post 16 Educational Pathways, and Study Skills.

Our work will culminate with a two night residential stay at PGL's Osmington Bay resort in Dorset during the Easter Holidays. Students will have plenty of opportunities to demonstrate their problem solving and team working whilst trying their hand at a range of new activities, including Climbing, a Sensory Trail, Zip Wire, and Coastal Management.

It has been a pleasure to work with these young people and we cannot wait for the trip to begin.

Careers Focus Year 10 Work Experience

On the 22nd of May, our Year 10 students will each take part in a week long work experience placement. Students have been asked to find a placement either by identifying one they have found themselves or by choosing the placement from the LINK2+ online website (https:// hcc.learnaboutwork.net/index.asp).


LINK2+ contains over 120 different work placements provided through Services for Young People (SfYP), who are supporting The Astley Cooper School in this project. If the students wish to choose a placement on the LINK2+ website, we ask that they choose a minimum of 3 placements and a maximum of 6. Each placement should be given a 'choice' (priority), and the choices should then be submitted to lock them in to the system. We ask that this process is completed by Friday 31st March. At the start of the summer term, we will contact the employers and parents to confirm which placement has been allocated.

Year 11

It is unbelievable that we find ourselves approaching the Easter Holidays. A time for relaxation and time for the students to prepare themselves for the start of the GCSE's. One step closer for some of our cohort to leave and go to College, other Sixth Forms, or apprenticeships. Some of our students will remain at The Astley Cooper School and be part of the exciting new school, which will be nothing short of magnificent when it is completed.

Since the start of September, the focus has been on wellbeing, revision, and preparation for life after 'Astley'. Many students have visited colleges and Sixth Forms and our career advisors have been helping students to decide where to go and what courses to enrol on. The cohort have had some excellent opportunities to help, support and guide them with their exams. Year 11s went to London for Poetry Live, where poems that they are studying were read aloud by the actual poet. The GCSE Sport group went to the University of Hertfordshire, our Geography students have been on two field trips, one to Epping Forest and the other to Hemel Hempstead to collate information that is required for their course. The Production Art students have had professional workers from the TV and Theatre world in to teach and demonstrate their skills to the Year 11's. The Art students went to the National Gallery and some of the dance students went to performances and competed in Dance Shows locally.

There was the History Trip where I received daily reports on the outstanding behaviour of our students.

Online 1:1 tuition has been offered to many students in numerous subjects and teachers at The Astley Cooper School have been working tirelessly with before and after school intervention to support our students.

Year 11 have been treated to several hot chocolate and biscuit break times to celebrate their outstanding attitude in lessons and around school. In fact, the Year 11's have done better than some of the younger year groups in receiving zero behaviour points. This has not always been the case.

I would like to thank you for your support in helping me and the pastoral team ensure a calm and consistent approach to school for your child. It is a stressful time for both students and parents/carers, but I feel that we have provided an exceptional platform for your child to do their very best in their GCSE's.

I hope that you and your families have a wonderful holiday. Happy Easter.




















Sixth Form News

It has been a busy term for the Sixth Form students with many events and opportunities for our students. Year 12 and 13 students completed their vocational BTEC examinations in January and have since received their grades for these with some fantastic results.

In PSHE, we were fortunate enough to watch the live screening of Prima Facie on National Theatre Live. Starring Jodie Comer, the play explored the themes of consent, the criminal justice system and the female experience. Following this, we had 'The Schools Consent Project' team in school to deliver a workshop to our Year 12 students about the legal definition of consent and key sexual offences. The aim of the play is to normalise conversations amongst young people, to empower them to identify and communicate their boundaries and to respect them.

In February, 20 Year 12 and Year 13 Psychology students attended a Forensic Psychology lecture run by leading Forensic Psychologist, Jennifer Rees. We travelled down to Wimbledon and the students really enjoyed themselves and came back with some excellent knowledge about the psychology of serial killers to support their BTEC Psychology coursework.

In January, we invited all students in Year 11 to have the opportunity to see what it would be like to study in our Sixth Form by attending 'Sixth Form discovery day'. Here, students were able to choose four subjects to explore and learn about, as well as find out more information on opportunities in the Sixth Form.

The deadline for Year 11 Sixth Form applications was in February with a record number of applications received. Interviews have also been conducted by the Sixth Form team who have been very impressed when speaking with our Year 11 students. Students will receive a conditional letter after Easter, as well as information regarding the July Sixth Form Induction.

















Year 12 News

Alongside their studies and working hard with their coursework, Year 12 has been contributing to the wider life of the school, and they are trying to broaden their horizons for their next steps.

The Year 12 Pre-Apprenticeship students have graduated from their Rising Futures programme, where they have worked on improving their resilience, developing their confidence, and ensuring they stand apart from others. They have been involved in wider community programmes such as 'Play your Part', where they worked with the Chiltern Rangers on developing a garden in Warners End, going to KPMG for a world of work session and a weekend residential, where they showed Leadership Skills with other students. This will help develop their employability skills.

Students also helped contribute to the Mencap Prom on the 8th of February. This was an event for the carers of people with learning difficulties. Students helped with ensuring the guests had an enjoyable evening and the feedback from the carers and the guests was very positive. These events will help with their UCAS applications and broaden The Astley Cooper School's Sixth Form standing in the community.

The Year 12 students have also been involved in wider activities such as the Pi Day in Maths and they will be involved in further events in the Summer Term.

Year 12 UCAS

In the summer term, Year 12 will be starting to look at their next steps after Sixth Form during PSHE lessons and form times. We would encourage students to start thinking about this process during the Easter holidays to prepare themselves for lessons. We will give the students more details about important dates after the holidays.

It would also benefit students to start looking into free subject specific summer residential courses that will help them write their university application, as well as give them an insight into the subject they wish to study. Several universities, including The University of Hertfordshire, offer placements shadowing students. The Sutton Trust and Nuffield also offer specific programmes and courses. UCAS Applications

Year 13 UCAS deadline closed in January and all the students who applied for University have heard back from the majority of their choices. Students need to reply to their offers by the following deadlines:

- If you receive your last decision on or before 18 May 2023, your reply date is **8 June 2023** (except if you're using Extra to find a place).
- If you receive your last decision on or before 12 July 2023, your reply date is **17 July 2023** (including Extra choices).

We would also like to remind Year 13 students that they should be applying for Student Finance now. The deadline for this is **Friday 19 May**.

Year 13 Leavers Day is on **Friday 26 May.** Students will be invited into school for an assembly before heading into London for their event.

We would like to take this opportunity to wish our Year 13's the best of luck in the summer exams.
