Science teacher Miss Bowen has worked at Astley Cooper for 12 years. Miss Bowen initially came here as a supply teacher, decided to join the staff, and became the Subject Leader in Science from 2012-15. She has seen the science department grow and flourish in her time here and has been a committed and loyal member of staff.

Our School Business and Personnel manager, Mrs Catterall, is retiring at the end of August after working at Astley Cooper for 16 years. Mrs Catterall has been a key member of the Senior Leadership Team. In addition to her skills in managing a budget and ensuring the financial stability of the school, Mrs Catterall has also led our response to the pandemic, liaising with Hertfordshire County Council, the Department for Education and the Health and Safety executive. She organised the rigorous testing programme we had to put in place in March this year and has worked closely with our Facilities Manager Paul Biswell in leading the school's work on the plans for the new building, which is due to be completed in the next two years.

After 24 years of loyal service to the school, in a variety of roles, Mrs Brown is also retiring this summer. Mrs Brown worked as a receptionist and a Teaching Assistant at the school before training to become a Higher Level Teaching Assistant and qualifying in 2010. For a number of years, Mrs Brown has taught science and maths to small groups of students and has shown great commitment to the dozens of young people in her care. She is always well prepared and ready for her classes who appreciate the safe and nurturing learning environment she creates.

We appreciate the difference that all these colleagues have made to our school and wish Mrs Allen, Mrs Catterall and Mrs Brown a retirement full of happiness.

New Staff Member

Mr Austin is a recently appointed cover supervisor who joined the school in May 2021 after having served over 35 years in the Royal Air Force as a logistics officer. In the Royal Air Force Mr Austin was a Squadron Leader and in November 2020 he qualified for a second clasp to his Long Service and Good Conduct Medal, but was unable to be presented with his award because of Covid regulations regarding social distancing.

In June 2021, while employed by Astley Cooper School, Mr Austin was invited to attend an Honours and Awards Ceremony at Royal Air Force High Wycombe and the school was delighted to release him to attend.

Squadron Leader Austin had been awarded his actual Long Service and Good Conduct Medal in November 2000 after 15 years' service. He subsequently was awarded a first clasp to the medal after a further 10 years' service in November 2010 and this second clasp was awarded in November 2020 after a total of 35 years.

The Long Service and Good Conduct Medal was instituted by King George V in 1919 and is

awarded to members of the armed forces in recognition of their long and distinguished service.

Business

It has been an extremely exciting year for Business in our school. It is the first time that we have introduced a BTEC vocational qualification in Business. Vocational qualifications are those which prepare students for future studies and for work. BTEC offers a combination of theoretical studies and practical knowledge, applied to real businesses.

60 students in Year 10 and seven students in Year 12 (Sixth Form) completed the first year of their respective studies: BTEC Award in Enterprise and BTEC Extended Certificate in Business Level 3. They have one more exciting year ahead of them.

In their first year, students wrote practical assignments about selected real companies. In their work, they used information collected from various websites and provided directly by these businesses.

The two real businesses which supported us in delivering our first BTEC assignments (coursework) were SWR (Steel Wire Rope) Group and London Institute of Banking and Finance. In addition, students in Year 12 wrote about M&S, Nintendo, Apple, Google and Airlite.

Students completed some amazing work, which resulted in the BTEC examining board rewarding their efforts. Well done to all the students for their hard work.

Examples of students' work:

Amna Shahzad, Year 12, Distinction, wrote about how innovation makes Nintendo successful.

What is Nintendo known for

Nintendo is the company that has created many of our favourite childhood games. Nintendo is known for using its selective creative process to innovate games that 'stick out for the crowd'. One of these games; that changed Nintendo as a company was their Super Mario Brothers series. Super Mario was first introduced in September of 1985, and has since been the ultimate success for Nintendo. Mario is a mascot that Nintendo features within its games and its brand. The Mario franchise has possessed such a huge success for Nintendo; that alongside their innovative game console releases, at least one Super Mario game has been released.

The Super Mario franchise is the best-selling game franchise of all time, with more than 670.97 million copies of games sold, including 354.04 million for the Super Mario games alone. Mario has become one of the highest-grossing media franchises of all time. Super Mario has now become a worldwide name and since its release, Nintendo has introduced more games with the same format. Nintendo has released tiles like "Mario Kart" and "Super Mario Odyssey" and many other games that represent the Mario franchise.

PEST (external factors)

To examine external factors, SWR uses PEST which describes political, economic, social and technological factors.

- Political
- The main political factor is Covid-19. A major lockdown due to the Covid-19 pandemic has heavily affected many businesses, including SWR. Many employees had to self-isolate or work from home.



employees had to self-isolate or work from home This became a huge staffing problem. Showrooms were also unfortunately closed for customers. In addition, they had to introduce social distancing in their work office. This had significantly affected the work and made it way challenging to operate. However, SWR was able to increase their sales thanks to the customers who were interested in improvement work.

Another notable political factor is Brexit. The UK has recently left the European Union, EU. However, the UK government managed to secure a Trade agreement with the EU, which allows trading goods between the UK and EU without paying any tariffs. This is very important for SWR, since they will not need to increase their prices and therefore customers will not be affected. This also means that SWR will most likely keep the amount of sales or even increase it. On the other hand, borders' checks and declarations for the goods traded between the UK and EU have been introduced. SWR will unfortunately need to pay more for the administration, and there might be border delays and issues. This should not heavily affect SWR, since they have been preparing for this for the past

Crystal Close, Y10 Distinction, delivered an analysis of internal factors influencing the success of SWR. This is what she concluded:

In my opinion, the internal factors of: unforeseen human resource costs, effective planning and financing and customer satisfaction are the most important for an enterprise to be successful. If businesses do not effectively plan for uncontrollable instances occurring, then the enterprise will not be organised and will have an increased risk in collapsing overall. In addition to this is the planning and financing, again if not done successfully can be vital to a company as the lack of organisation can result in money being spent without reason and plans not being accomplishable. Customer satisfaction may possibly be the most important factor as consumers are the people purchasing an enterprise's available goods and services; without them, sales and profit will fall drastically and the company will most likely collapse. As it is demonstrated with SWR, focusing on these factors and understanding staff and customer opinions and feelings, it can majorly assist in a business succeeding.

Zach Minter, Y10 Distinction, discussed the use of market research by SWR.

SWR has collected its primary research in a multitude of different ways including a survey where they asked customers various different questions about their enterprise to find out what was good about it and what can be improved on. The survey was constructed in a way that SWR would be able to measure the level of customer satisfaction regarding different aspects of their business in order for them to be able to improve areas where there was a possible situation of having a lower number of satisfied customers than with other enterprises, therefore they can take these responses into careful consideration and figure out a way to increase the number of satisfied customers. This course of action will allow SWR to further succeed as an enterprise and gain the upper hand over their competitors.

There are many more excellent examples of students' work. I wanted to congratulate all the students for their achievement. I would also like to thank Jason Lee, the CEO of SWR for his support and involvement and Mr Lally for his leadership and encouragement.

Brilliant Club

We have been running the Brilliant Club programme with students since 2018. Sadly, our placements have been delayed and cancelled several times since March 2020 so we have been delighted that we have finally been able to run a Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4 placement this half-term.

The programme aims to widen access to university for outstanding students in non-selective state schools. 12 students in Year 10, six students in Year 9 and six students in Year 8 were selected to take part, with the aim of encouraging them to think about going to university in the future.

Students participated in a virtual launch in May. As part of this session, the students participated in a study skills session. They were given information, advice and guidance about applying to university and what university life is like. Key Stage Four students were given a taste of life at Queens College, University of Cambridge. Key Stage Three students were given an insight into life at Leeds University. Both groups had the chance to meet and ask questions of current students.

From May to June, the students were involved in weekly tutorials with their tutors. Year 10 have been working with Kelly Hatley, developing their creative writing and critical analysis skills by looking at the horror-comedy genre. Year 8 and 9 have been working with Katie Faulkner following an art history course looking at power, personality and portraiture. The students were asked to complete an assignment on their topic area and have received individual support and feedback on their written work. This assignment was marked using degree level criteria and mark schemes.

The tutors came into school in July to feedback to students on their assignments and let them know whether they had passed. Their graduation ceremonies took place in school after this. These were a great opportunity to celebrate their achievements and reflect on what they had learned during the process. Many have commented that it has given them the confidence and self-belief to think they could go to university in the future.

A Short History of Astley Cooper

As Astley Cooper is about to begin the next phase of its development with the appointment of a new headteacher and the beginning of a multi-million pound building programme that will considerably improve the site and its facilities, it feels timely to have a brief look back at the school's history.

Astley Cooper - or Grove Hill as it was then - was the last secondary school



built in Hemel Hempstead. It took its first intake in September 1965 and opened in 1967 in St Agnells Lane as Grove Hill Technical Grammar School.

Technical Grammar Schools were for children who had passed the 11+ and wanted to study the sciences, mathematics and engineering. Cavendish was also a Technical Grammar School in the 1960s.

In 1970, five years after the creation of comprehensive schools under Harold Wilson's Labour Government, Cavendish and Grove Hill Technical Grammar schools became comprehensive.

In September 1984, Highfield School (about 200 students) in Fletcher Way and Grove Hill (about 800 students) merged and worked across two sites as The Astley Cooper School, named after Sir Astley Cooper (1768-1841), a surgeon and anatomist who lived in the village of Hemel Hempstead. From September 1986, the whole school moved to the St Agnells Lane site.

Wolfgang Slessenger, a Cambridge graduate and maths teacher, who had been the headteacher of Grove Hill since it opened, retired at the end of the spring term in 1987. He had been the headteacher of the school, in its various incarnations, for 22 years.

Mr Slessenger was followed by Mel Ingman, who was the headteacher for 13 years, from April 1987 to May 2000. Anne Smithers became the next headteacher and was at the school for 11 years. I joined the school, initially as the interim headteacher, in September 2011.

I am proud to have been part of Astley Cooper's vibrant community for the last 10 years. The school's new headteacher, Sam Orsborne, is looking forward to introducing himself to you in September, as the next stage of the school's long history begins.


Languages Week

MDb Synopsis: Jaime Escalante is a mathematics teacher in a school in a Hispanic neighbourhood. Convinced that his students have potential, he adopts unconventional teaching methods to help gang members and no-hopers pass the rigorous Advanced Placement exam in calculus.

The Martian (PG-13)

IMDb Synopsis: An astronaut becomes stranded on Mars after his team assume him dead, and must rely on his ingenuity to find a way to signal to Earth that he is alive.

Why? The Martian is probably the best STEM movie ever. There are countless scenes where Matt Damon has to use mathematics and mathematical reasoning to overcome challenges and advance his quest for survival. If you are looking to show your children that maths can take you places then *The Martian* is your best choice.







This was a partial eclipse but if you want to see the next total Solar Eclipse from the UK then put this date in your diary: 23 September 2090.






This term Year 7 students started learning about Citizenship including British

Languages week

Mr Moscovici delivered a special assembly, acknowledging that most people in the world speak some English and as technological advancements mean our phones can translate for us, Mr Moscovici queried why we should still learn languages. As part of the assembly students found out about untranslatable concepts and how the language you speak shapes the way you experience the world.

For example, did you know that...

- If you speak Kuuk Thayorre, you will always know which direction north is
- German people see the Grim Reaper as a man, but Spanish people see the Grim Reaper as a woman. This is because *Der Tod* is masculine, but *La muerte* is feminine
- Spanish speakers struggle to remember details of a crime they have witnessed compared to English speakers
- If rain is mentioned in a book, it is usually translated into 'sun' in Swahili
- The Pirahã language of northwest Brazil has no words for numbers
- In Italian there are three different words for blue. In Inuit there are at least 40 different words for snow
- In the Inuit translation of the Bible, the expression "Lamb of God" was translated as "Seal of God" because Inuit people had never seen a lamb before

Students were also fortunate to have a staff that is committed to language learning. Every single subject and teacher got involved. We had a language of the day every day and students answered the registers in these languages. Why not ask your child how to say hello in one of these languages to see if they can remember?

Monday: Italian (salve)

Tuesday: Polish (cześć)

Wednesday: Mandarin (你好) (nǐ hǎo)

Thursday: Russian (Привет) (privyet)

Friday: Romanian (Bună ziua)



In every lesson of the week students learned about how languages link to their learning. In KS3 Maths, students learned numbers in Tamil, and in KS4 students tried answering GCSE questions in other languages.









Languages Week

In Art students created pieces inspired by music in foreign languages, while in Computer Science they compared spoken human languages with computer languages. Mr Elliott labelled all of the tools in the Technology Work Shop in other languages. History students learned how English has evolved and changed over time, and in Geography students also learned how to have basic conversations in the countries they have been studying this year. PRE treated its learners to how the Norse gods got their names in the different Scandinavian languages. PSHE taught a lesson about racism through the medium of Italian, and Science studied how the brain processes language.

Production Arts took the event by storm with some lovely lessons. In Music, learners analysed foreign music, in Dance the warm up was to Spanish music, and in Drama students examined an extract from *Small*

Geography

Year 12 are currently carrying out a trampling survey around Astley Cooper, to prepare them for their coursework, to be completed in Year 13. In these photos, the students are sampling the number of species and the amount of vegetation cover in the transect at different intervals, by using a quadrat. The students are following a geographical sequence of enquiry to plan the fieldwork investigation, collect data and analyse it in order to prove or disprove their hypothesis. They looked at four areas around the school site in order to gain a balanced view of the amount of trampling around the school. It was a beautiful day when we collected the data and was an enjoyable experience for both the students and geography staff.





Year 7 are studying a unit on China, and this piece of work was based on a video that we watched about the forgotten generation of rural villages in China. It was a free choice of task, and Finley shows in his poem, the emotion of the children who are left behind in the villages by their parents, while they go to work in the cities.
