

I know that the last 18 months have been challenging for the country as we have returned from the difficulties of the Covid pandemic, only to be met with economic hardships and international issues including the war in Ukraine as well as public sector strike action. The fallout from the war in Ukraine is continuing to impact on the whole school community as the cost of living increases and resources are harder to come by. I want to remind you to reach out to the school if you need support or assistance, as well as looking out for those around you who may be finding life difficult. The Department for Education and education unions have potentially reached an agreement on funding, workload and teacher pay which will hopefully mean school is not affected by strike days during the next academic year and we can focus on maximising the attendance of all students, every single day.

We have also seen an increase in the negative and damaging rhetoric towards public services from global and national leaders as well as a funding crisis which has impacted on the recruitment of teachers and support staff onto training courses and therefore into schools. This is a challenging time for schools. The number of teachers available to fill vacant roles in schools has reduced and schools in challenging areas are finding it even more difficult to recruit the good staff who will help their students to make progress to catch up with those in more advantaged areas.

As a school, we have managed to recruit a number of excellent staff to replace those who are moving on to new adventures; some in new schools and others in different professions. I wish those leaving all the very best for the future and I ask that you support us into the new academic year by discussing with your children how important excellent behaviour, hard work and focus are to a successful future to support new staff joining us. I want the staff at The Astley Cooper School to be able to teach fun and enjoyable lessons where all students can achieve their full potential. Wellbehaved, well equipped students are a crucial part of helping us achieve this. Students in exam year groups should look out for work on Google Classroom over the summer to prepare them for the next academic year. Please support us by helping them to find the time to complete this before they return in September.

























Diversity Week

Diversity Week started with a bang on our Disability Awareness day where Gareth Tyler, an ex Astley Cooper pupil returned, 25 years on, to speak to all the year groups about his journey struggling with Dyslexia and ADHD. He has become a successful musician and runs his own music school, Sound Box.

His amazing drum demonstration and speech enthused the pupils and helped to raise aspirations and awareness regarding achievement and success! He was joined by Sophie, who has learning difficulties and who presented the work she does with resin in designing jewellery and ornaments. Her beautiful work has developed with her buying her own workshop where she is growing her business!

We also had Monty, our therapy dog in school where pupils could meet him and spend some time understanding what he does to support children.













Thursday was a day to celebrate and raise awareness around LGBTQ+. Shae and Jamie from Service for Young People joined us for the day and did workshops with all of Year 8, educating them around the history of LGBTQ and also considering hate crime and what constitutes this. They had their pop up stand in the hall at lunch time promoting all the local work they do in Dacorum with young people that covers a range of interventions for all needs.









Friday was our Culture Day where pupils were invited to attend school wearing cultural wear or colours of their flag. It was amazing to see all the different outfits celebrated in school representing a range of different cultures we have here!

Our key speaker Ayo Fowale, who is a spoken word performance poet, spoke to year 9 and 10 about his journey into poetry and the childhood which led him to find this outlet. He performed a range of his original poetry, covering topics such as race struggles, gang violence and freedom.

He was joined by Imrana Mahmood, who spoke to inspire our pupils around the Creative Arts and production. She spoke specifically about her experience as a Muslim lady and how this impacted her experience within this career. Pupils were so engaged and asked some great questions to our visitors.

During lunch time we offered a Djembe Drumming workshop, facilitated by Kris Banks, where pupils got to experience playing Djembe's and learned some key drum rhythms. The participants were so involved and had a really fun time playing these together.

We ended the day with a photo shoot of all the pupils who had come to school in cultural wear (as well as some staff!) celebrating the beautiful outfits and with Ayo leading some poetry workshops. Some of the work produced by the pupils was highly impressive and they read their work out loud at the end of the workshop.

On Wednesday 5 July, we took a strong squad of Athletes to Jarman Park for District Sports Day. We had a very successful day with numerous personal bests and 14 medals including 2 golds. An incredible 8 school records were also broken during the day! Well done to all that participated.

Norfolk Trip

The PE rewards trip to Norfolk Lakes Manor Adventure was incredibly popular with the current Year 7's and 8's with a total of 75 students attending. Whilst we were there, students enjoyed a variety of activities including Giant Stand Up Paddle Boarding, Kayaking, Rifle shooting, High ropes and Crate stacking. A personal favourite of every student was the Giant Stand Up Paddle Boards where most spent the hour and a half trying to push their instructors and teachers off to claim the board for themselves.

The students' attitude and behaviour were fantastic. They all did their best and many pushed past their fear of heights to enjoy the different activities. Many students finished the trip saying they will be coming again next year.











Geography

As part of their GCSE Geography course, Year 10 Geography students went to Brighton and Brick Lane, to carry out fieldwork investigations to help them with their exams in Year 11.

On Monday 10th July, we went to Brighton and were met with a beautiful sunny day. We were there to investigate how wave action changes the beach, to fit in with the coasts section of our curriculum. In order to do this, we measured beach profiles, the size and shape of sediment (pebbles), the number of waves and longshore drift. The students were very excited to be at the seaside, and practiced their stone skimming skills alongside their fieldwork skills. It was the perfect opportunity to enjoy the sea air, have an ice-cream and observe the gentle summer waves lapping on the beach. Due to the day being so warm, and the breeze being strong, we didn't notice the strength of the sun, so there were a few sunburnt faces when we got back.

On Tuesday 11th July, we went to the East End of London to study how the environmental quality changes from the Whitechapel part of Brick Lane to Spitalfields Market. We carried out different fieldwork techniques from the Brighton trip, to give students the opportunity to try out new skills, while investigating how people have changed the environment. We carried out pedestrian counts, traffic counts and environmental quality surveys to show how the areas changed as we walked from Whitechapel, up Brick Lane to Spitalfields Market. The market was a firm favourite with all the students, as we were able to buy a delicious lunch there. We walked a long way in London that day, and the coach ride home was definitely quiet due to lots of tired students.

All in all, both trips were worthwhile for all the students who attended, and lots of fun was had by all.































Year 9 Cadbury World


Year 9 Geography students went to Cadbury World to learn about how chocolate bars are made. We went to the factory in Bourneville to link with our topic on Globalisation, where we have been studying the spread of global products around the world.

During the day, students were invited to practice their artistic skills by drawing with chocolate. We sampled some of Cadbury World's finest produce (for free!) as well as visiting the Cadbury World shop, posing in front of a green screen for a picture and riding through Cadbury Bean land. We also looked into the world of advertising and how the Cadbury brand has grown over the past 100 years, to make it the worldwide brand that it is today.

History Trips

Year 9 Trip to the Battlefields

An early start on Thursday was followed by a hop over the channel to explore the battlefields of the First Worlds War. The focus of the trip was not just fun, but remembrance for those



who gave their lives. The pupils were able to visit several memorials and cemeteries, exploring, for some, the resting places of their relatives. Two pupils were chosen to lay the wreath on behalf of the school at a daily ceremony at the Menin Gate in Ypres. On the first day pupils were able to visit the largest British First World War cemetery on the Western Front, Tyne Cot. Some were also given the opportunity to fire blanks from a rifle or pistol in the recreated trenches at the Hooge Museum.

On the second day, we made our way to the Somme region of France and explored the Sunken Lane, Hawthorn Crater, Newfoundland Park, Ulster tower and the Thiepval Memorial. All of these sites showed the British perspective or the perspective of those who were from the British Empire but we were accompanied by a Bavarian tour guide who helped pupils to understand the German side of the war. Pupils found this very valuable and really enjoyed hearing from Christoph!

The final day started in Leonidas chocolate shop for some Belgian mementos. Stops were made in Messines and at the Island of Ireland Peace Park before the coach stopped working! Luckily our tour company were able to provide us with a local hostel for pupils to be able to use their games room and the huge field for football to relax in whilst we waited for the coach to be either replaced or fixed. Not long after we were on our way to Langemark German Cemetery and were able to appreciate the different ways of memorialising soldiers from different parts of the world.

Year 7 trip to Mountfitchet Castle

Fifty Year 7 students went to Mountfitchet Castle on a trip in June. They were able to explore the area in bright sunshine and move around the castle. Pupils were able to feed the rescued farm animals and learn about life in a castle in rural England. During the day, pupils were also able to explore the museum full of toys from the last 120 years! Some that the teachers were more familiar with and some that the pupils

remember from their own toy boxes!
























Performing Arts Awards Evening

Forever grateful for the memories, the highs.
























Sixth Form News

Year 13

Year 13 Results day is on **Thursday 17 August.** School will be open from 10.00 am until 12.00pm to collect results. Staff will be on hand to help with any issues and to help you with clearing should it be needed.

We would also like to congratulate Year 12 students on their hard work and commitment throughout the year.

In PSHE, students are currently in the process of working their way through the Post 18 Next Steps programme, which supports the students through their university application via UCAS.

They have also been out on Work Shadowing for three days this term, which has allowed them to gain an insight into their chosen career and give them valuable experience when applying for University courses or employment.























Researcher in Residence Programme

This term, six Year 12 girls have taken part in a project with the prestigious university, London School of Economics. They became researchers in their own right, working alongside LSE Cites, Make Space for Girls and Countryside (who are building the new housing, "Spencer's Park", in Maylands). They worked tirelessly for six weeks, investigating ways of creating safe, exciting and enjoyable public spaces for girls to use in our local area. The project ended with a joint workshop between the Year 12 and the Year 10 girls, who worked with Make Space for Girls last academic year. It was amazing to see the collaboration between the two groups. The Year 12 girls will now be listed as authors on the official academic paper that will be published. This is an amazing achievement for students of this age and will certainly be an exciting addition to their UCAS personal statements.

Y11 into 12 Sixth Form Induction

Over a two-week period, we welcomed Year 11 students for our Sixth Form Induction. On the first day, students listened to an induction assembly and took part in study skills sessions, which was then followed by team building activities. For the remainder of the induction period, students arrived in school for their allocated subject induction lessons where they received more information about the course and were taught the start of the Year 12 content. The attendance throughout the week was very good; it was great to see so many Year 11 students back in school, dressed smartly, with a positive attitude for the start of their Sixth Form studies.

The induction sessions were fantastic; a really useful process for the students and it has helped to prepare them for September, as well as ensure that students have chosen the correct subjects.



























Transition work and Registration

Students have all been invited to the Sixth Form Google Classroom; here is where the Sixth Form team posts important information throughout the year. In September, the registration and code of conduct form will be issued to students.

All students who have applied to study in the Sixth Form will need to ensure that they complete the transition work for each subject they wish to study and return these to school to their subject teacher in September. Teachers explained these in the last induction session and work can be found in each subject's Google Classroom. These can also be found on the school website under the Sixth Form page.

If any students in Year 11 have had their situation change for next year, and would like to apply to join our Sixth Form, please speak to Mrs Ollerenshaw-East on results day or on Monday 4 September when school starts.

Results Day

Thursday 24 August is GCSE results day; there will be a number of staff around to help students with their results. All students who applied for the Sixth Form must meet with a member of the Sixth Form team on results day.

Year 12 will then be required in school on Monday 4 September, until 12:30pm. Students should meet in the Sixth Form area. Students must be on time and in the correct dress code. Lessons for all Sixth Form students will start on Tuesday 5 September.
