## Year 11 Revision Menu

Use these ideas to help plan your revision if you are unsure what to do. There is no chunk of time too small or too large that you can't fit in some English revision.

There are two sides of English, the skills-based side and the content of Literature. You need to do a combination of revision activities. Don't just focus on the short activities. You could do more of these each week, but you should also complete past papers too.

If you have 15-20 minutes...

| 10 Minute Quick Plan <br> Using past paper questions, spend 10 minutes planning your response. <br> This could be lang or lit. You can't spend more than 10 minutes doing this. |

If you have 30 minutes...

| Read a Chapter <br> For this you will need your copy of either 'A Christmas Carol' or 'Frankenstein'. <br> Read through each chapter (or Stave for ACC) and check your understanding. <br> Summarise the chapter and | Read an Act <br> For this you will need your copy of An Inspector Calls. <br> Take 30 minutes to read each act and check through your notes and annotations. <br> You could also do this with Macbeth, but this may take you longer depending on the act. | Read the Opening of a Book <br> Analyse how the writer has structured the opening $2-3$ pages to have an impact on the reader. | Reading NonFiction <br> Choose an Online Opinion Piece <br> Predict what is about from the title. <br> Note any questions you have as you are reading. <br> Re-read to clarify what you are unsure of. <br> Summarise the article in less than 100 words. | Beginning, Middle and End <br> Choose a character from one of the literature texts and track their character development at the beginning, middle and end of the text. <br> Include quotations to support your ideas. | Mirror Characters <br> Choose two characters that are opposites (E.g Scrooge and Fezziwig, <br> Macbeth and Macduff, Inspector and Mr Birling) <br> Create VENN diagrams showing how they are different and why the writer has done this. |
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| Explode a Quotation <br> Choose 3 quotations from the text of your choice and analyse them in detail. ## Top Tips

- Be prepared beforehand, half an hour easily becomes 20 minutes by the time you have got a cup of tea and a biscuit. Get your drinks and snacks ready, so you can power through and get a full revision session in.
- Plan your time - schedule breaks for fresh air, catch up with a friend/family and getting more drinks and snacks. Make sure you take some time away from your desk between activities.
- Be honest with yourself. Are you REALLY revising hard or are you randomly reading and highlighting things and making your notes look pretty? Give yourself a grade of 1-10 for effort, enthusiasm and productivity after each revision session. How can you make it better next time if your session didn't go as well?
- Just as much as this is about doing too little, you can't sustain too much either! you won't be ready for effective sessions if you are working all hours. Plan effectively
- Use the pomodoro technique to stay focused and be efficient!
- Set up a revision group with your friends and use this as an opportunity to share your responses to ask for critical feedback or to encourage each other to revise.


## Using the Pomodoro Technique

This is a way of developing your productivity. It is named after the shape of the tomato shaped cooking timer that the creator (Cirillo) used to time each session.

A pomodoro $=25$ minutes
So set a timer on your phone or borrow the kitchen timer and use this to help with your revision!
See the image below for how to break up your time. Don't do this if you are doing a full timed paper though! You should be learning to focus for extended periods of time then.
